Courageous Leadership - Part 2

BOTTOM LINE:

Expressions of courage are essential to leadership.

KEY TAKEAWAYS:

There are three expressions of courage that can apply to every leader:

1. Courageous leadership knows that opportunity does not equal obligation.

- The ability to identify and focus on the few *necessary* things is a hallmark of great leadership.
- Learn to say no. Refusing to say no eventually robs leaders of their ultimate opportunity: the opportunity to play to their strengths.
- Leaders and organizations that entangle themselves in an array of unrelated "opportunities" dilute their effectiveness in every area.

2. Courageous leadership is the courage to face current reality.

- To courageously face current reality, leaders must be relentless in their quest to discover the truth about what is happening around them.
- Facing current reality requires leaders to:
 - o Not pretend.
 - o Not turn a blind eye.
 - o Not exaggerate.
 - Not shoot the bearer of bad news.
 - o Not hide behind the numbers.
 - o Not ignore constructive criticism.
 - o Not isolate themselves.

3. Courageous leadership is the courage to dream.

- Dreaming requires courage.
- Leaders must allow their minds to wander outside the boundaries of *what is* and begin to create a mental picture of *what could be*.
- When leaders are no longer willing to dream, it's only a short time until followers will be unwilling to follow.
