BOTTOM LINE:

Integrity: Doing what you ought to even if it costs you.

KEY TAKEAWAYS

- I. Integrity: doing what you ought to, even when it costs you.
 - A. Integrity is a personal decision, but as a leader people depend on you for their jobs and their livelihoods. Therefore, your *irresponsibility* quickly becomes someone else's *responsibility*.
 - B. One failure of personal integrity has the power to cancel or cast a shadow over a lifetime of good decisions.
- II. Compromised integrity leads to a dangerous sequence of more compromised integrity.
 - A. The first integrity breach makes the second breach easier.
 - B. The second breach of integrity creates a pattern.
 - C. A pattern creates a direction.
 - D. Direction, not intention, determines our destination and our legacy.
- III. Those in leadership for the long haul will have their integrity tested in four primary areas.
 - A. **Money:** Leaders will have to say no to opportunities for income that while legal, may not be moral.
 - B. **Liberty** (i.e. freedoms): Leaders will have to say no to certain liberties that everyone around them might be taking.
 - C. Recognition: Leaders will have to say no to entitlements they might deserve.
 - D. Pleasure: Leaders will have to say no to pleasures they crave.
- IV. What will you do when you know doing what you ought to will cost you?
 - A. The answer to this question depends on what is most important to you.
 - B. How you answer this question reveals if your integrity is disposable, if it's a means to or end, or if it is actually *the* end.
 - 1. Integrity is *the* end when the supreme value you hold is knowing you did the right thing.
- V. Leaders must value their integrity more than the thing they might gain from sacrificing their integrity.
 - A. When we sacrifice our integrity, it is often for an imagined outcome. In reality, the only certainty is that integrity has been compromised. Additionally, unanticipated outcomes arise:
 - 1. Being in conflict with yourself
 - 2. Carrying around secrets
 - 3. Feeling insecure because you're out of balance with yourself
 - B. Sacrificing integrity leads to getting stuck. And the only way to get unstuck is to go public with something you never should have done in the first place.

1. Describe a time when you were faced with a decision where doing the right thing would cost you something. How did you handle the situation?

- 3. In which of the four primary areas listed (money, liberty, recognition, pleasure) do you find it hardest to say no? What can you do to hold yourself accountable in this area?
- 4. Practically, what would it look like to throw up your hands and say, "Regardless of this outcome, I will still choose to do what I know I ought to"?

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
